PROGRAM

PP Steve Dyer introduced our guest speaker, MG Stephen D. Tom, Commander Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command. Major General Tom was commissioned a 2nd Lt through the Army Reserve Officer's Training Corps Program in 1971 after receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Michigan. He continued his civilian education by entering Boston University School of Law, and gradu-

ated with a Juris Doctor degree in 1974. Since completing the U.S. Army Field Artillery Officer Basic Course in 1975, Major General Tom has served in a number of commands. He was promoted to Major General in July 2003 and then served as U.S. Army Pacific Deputy Commander for Mobilization and Reserve Affairs. Prior to coming to JPAC, he served as the Chief of Staff, United States Pacific Command. In addition to the Field Artillery Officer Basic Course, Major General Tom is a graduate of the Judge Advocate Officer Basic Course, the Adjutant General Officer's Advance Course, Command and General Staff College, the Civil Affairs Officer's Advanced Course, and he Army War College. His military awards and decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal, Defense Superior Service, Legion of Merit and various other unit and service medals. In his civilian capacity, Major General Tom was a private practice attorney and a partner in a law firm. He was recalled to active duty in January 2006.

The Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command, located on the island of Oahu in Hawaii, was activated on October 1, 2003. Created from the merger of the 30 year old U.S. Army Central Identification Laboratory, Hawaii, and the 11-year-old Joint Task Force - Full Accounting, JPAC is commanded by a flag office. The mission of JPAC is to achieve the fullest possible accounting of all Americans missing as a result of the nation's past conflicts. The highest priority of the organization is the return of any living Americans that remain prisoners of war.

The command is made up of approximately 400 hand-picked Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines, Department of the Navy civilians and contractors. The laboratory portion of JPAC, referred to as the Central Identification Laboratory (CIL), is one of the largest and most scientifically diverse laboratories in the world, and is the only accredited Skeletal Identification Laboratory (ASCLD-LAB) in the United States.

Three permanent overseas detachments assist with command & control and in-country support during investigation and recovery operations; Detachment One located in Bangkok, Thailand; Detachment Two in Hanoi, Vietnam; and Detachment Three in Vientiane, Laos. A fourth detachment, Detachment Four is located in Hawaii and is responsible for recovery team personnel when they are not deployed.

The core of JPAC's day-to-day operations involves investigating leads, recovering, and identifying Americans who were killed in action but were never brought home. This process involves close coordination with other U.S. agencies involved in the POW/MIA issue, including the Defense POW/Missing Personnel Office, U.S. Pacific Command, Department of State, the Joint Staff, Defense Intelligence Agency, and the Armed Forces DNA Identification Laboratory, and the U.S. Air Force's Life Sciences Equipment Laboratory.

In order to ensure mission success and the return of all unaccounted-for Americans, JPAC routinely engages in technical negotiations and talks with representatives of foreign governments to promote and maintain positive in-country conditions wherever JPAC teams deploy.

On average, the CIL identifies an MIA about every four days. Since 2003, JPAC has identified more than 560 Americans, and more than 1,800 since the accounting effort began in the 1970's.

Eighteen authorized recovery teams travel throughout the world to recover missing Americans from World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, and the Cold War. Recovery missions can last from 30 to 60 days, depending on the location, terrain and nature of the recovery. Reaching a site can be a challenge in itself. Team members routinely walk through jungles, traverse difficult terrain in 4x4 vehicles, rappel cliffsides, wade through swamps, and climb mountains. Transportation methods may include horseback, all terrain vehicles, boat, train or helicopter.

While JPAC's CIL identifies about seven Americans a

month on average, the recovery and identification process may take years to complete. In addition to the factors previously mentioned, each separate line of evidence must be examined at the CIL (bones, teeth, and material evidence) and correlated with all historical evidence.

Once identification has been completed, cases are forwarded to the appropriate service mortuary affairs office, whose members personally notify next
