



Connie presented **Ken Brown Jr.** with his father's Rotary badge.

PROGRAM

Program Chair, **Jeff Deer** introduced **Mike Smola**. **Mike** is the curator of public programs at the Hawaiian Mission Houses historic site and archives, he has a BA in history and a graduate certification in museum studies from Michigan State University. He has been in the museum profession for eight years. Originally from Chicago, for the past 4 years **Mike** has lived in Kaaawa, writes poetry, and is a hiking, camping, and outdoor enthusiast.

The Mission Houses Museum connects the story of the American Protestant missionaries and their descendants to the history and culture of Hawai'i, in order to give present generations of residents and visitors a deeper understanding of, and appreciation for, Hawai'i's rich and complex history.

Mike said the museum is a place where history happened; people lived, did their work and had lives



there, which makes this museum different from other museums. Missions Houses is an historic site dating back to 1820 with the arrival of the protestant missionaries. They were given this land by Kamehameha II to start the mission. It has been on the Historic Register since 1960. It is the educational arm of the Hawaii Children's Society.

Missionaries became interested in Hawaii as a result of the memoirs of Henry Opi'kaha'ia who grew up on the Big Island, saw his family killed during a rebellion, swam out to a ship in the harbor and became a sailor at the age of 15, he never saw the islands again. Henry went to Yale University, learned Latin, Greek, and Hebrew. He died of fever at the age of 26

Early missionaries were mostly from what is now the United Church of Christ (Congregationalists)

There are three historic buildings on the site:

Frame House (Hale Lā'au) (1821)

The oldest wood frame structure still standing in the Hawaiian Islands, it was shipped around Cape Horn from Boston in 1820. It was used as a communal home by many missionary families who shared it with island visitors and boarders.



Chamberlain House (Ka Hale Kamalani) (1831)



This house bears the name of the Mission's first secular agent in Hawai'i - Levi Chamberlain. In 1831. Chamberlain contracted for the building of this structure. which was to be used as a depository. The building was made of coral blocks cut away from the ocean reef, which were dried and bleached by the sun. These blocks were arranged and

assembled to build the Chamberlain House. From this location, Levi Chamberlain was able to plan out and undertake the disbursement of provisions for the

entire Sandwich Islands Mission. It now serves as the Museum's temporary Exhibition Gallery.

Printing Office (Ka Hale Pa'i) (1841)

Also built from coral blocks, this structure was completed in 1841 and contains replica of the first printing press be brought to Hawaii. Here, some of the



first books and printed materials in Hawaii were produced. The restored printing office shows how early Protestant Missionaries and native Hawaiians collaborated on the production of numerous books and other printed materials first printed in the Hawaiian language. The first printing press to come to Hawaii is

still in the office

The archives contain the largest supply of written Hawaiian material in the world. Over 120 million pages were printed in 20 years, almost all of it in Hawaiian. Missionaries alphabetized the Hawaiian



language, and then simplified the size of the alphabet. A bible published in 1822 was the first printing of the Hawaiian language. The museum also has the largest collection of letters and diaries kept and by the missionaries.

The Museum has tours, a Cemetery Pupu Theatre with first person interpretation near the persons grave, and hands on experiences such as printing.


They also have archives for research. They are currently digitizing the archived works, e.g., an 1838 Dr. Judd's volume on the human body.

The museum is located on 553 South King Street near the cemetery behind Kawaiaha'o Church.
