PROGRAM

Program Chair, **Jeff Deer**, introduced **Jacque LeBlanc**, Director of Community Relations since 2004 for the Hawaii Humane Society. **Jacque** is a long time animal lover, originally from Vietnam having moved here when she was 3 years old. Since 1942, the Hawaii Humane Society in the heart of Moiliili has become a their busy shelter and community hub for animal lovers. Featuring 30 programs and services focused on strengthening the human animal bond, rescuing the abused, engaging volunteers, and fighting



for better laws, they care for nearly 30,000 animals a year.

As an animal welfare organization, the Society is also very much a people business; educating young and old and working to find solutions to the challenges of a diverse and fast-growing community. The Hawaii Humane Society is Oahu's only open admissions shelter every day of the year.

A collar, tag and microchip help Hawaiian Humane Society reunite thousands of animals with their owners every year. By simply complying with the laws that require cats to have ID and dogs to wear a countyissued license, you can help your missing pet get home. You can get your cat or dog micro chipped at the Humane Society for \$15, which includes registration in Oahu's microchip database.

As a public service, the Humane Society keeps the master database of Oahu's pets, so ensure your contact information is always kept current. Microchips used for pet identification are about the size of a grain of rice. In a procedure similar to a vaccination, the microchip is injected just under the skin between the shoulder blades and lasts for life. Each microchip contains a unique number that is kept on file at the Humane Society.



Jacque also promoted the Society's foster care program which helps care for thousands of orphaned and owned animals in need of temporary care. They welcome families to participate in the Foster Care Program and students to utilize our program for service learning projects. This past year the Hawaiian Humane Society placed more than 2,000 shelter animals in foster homes. All basic supplies and medical care are provided. Temporary, short-term fostering services are offered upon availability of community volunteers to those temporarily hospitalized, the disabled and victims of domestic violence. The emergency foster program is not offered to those needing assistance due to housing issues, travel plans or awaiting pet-friendly housing.


IN THE WAKE

The Hawaiian Humane Society' non-profit adoption center is supported by donations.

Oahu's widest variety of dogs, cats and rabbits are available for a small adoption fee and include a spectrum of services: sterilization, post-adoption care and microchip identification. There is no time limit on how long they keep an animal. They do not place animals on hold and frequently have puppies and kittens. On rare occasions, viewable animals may not be available for adoption due to medical reasons, ownership or other special exceptions.

The Pet Food Bank is a new program. Since its inception in 2010, the Pet Food Bank has distributed food to more than 1,000 pets and their people. The first priority is to help those on any form of government assistance including unemployment and the homeless.

Melina Patrick, Special Events Director spoke briefly about PetWalk 2012, the biggest pet-friendly celebration of the year on October 7, 2012 at Magic Island beginning at 8:00am. On event day, thousands of people and pets get together for their big mahalo party featuring food, fun, and entertainment, to commemorate the generous donations they've collected. Event highlights include a people & pet costume contest, pet float competition, mahalo gifts for top fundraisers, great giveaways and so much more!



President **Doug** thanked **Jacque LeBlanc** and **Melina Patrick** and asked them to sign a book; *Miss Bindergarten Gets Ready for Kindergarten* by **Joseph Slate**, to be donated to Aiea Elementary School to promote literacy.


